I. Course Overview

1. Course Description

This course is designed to provide students with a solid foundation in multiple aspects of working with clay and its transformative process into ceramics, through the study of traditional Korean ceramics. The course focuses primarily on ceramics from the Silla period (57 B.C.–935 A.D.), the Goryeo period (918–1392), and the Joseon period (1392–1910), providing historical context as needed. Students will develop basic ceramic hand-building skills, learn traditional Korean decorative techniques, and create their own ceramic artworks.

2. Prerequisites

No prerequisite is required. Please bring a copy of the syllabus on the first day of class and dress properly as we will be working with clay.



3. Course Format

Explanation of course format:

- This is a hands-on, process-oriented studio course. The course consists of demonstrations, studio assignments, research, and an individual field trip.
 - Demonstrations will be provided as the course progresses.
 - The course includes an individual field trip, which requires the submission of a written paper. Students will visit an exhibition at the National Museum of Korea.
 - Permanent Exhibition: Sculpture and Craft and Prehistory and Ancient History sections
 - Students must select one to two works to analyze and discuss.
 - The paper must be at least one page in length (11-point font), excluding images.

4. Course Objectives

This course explores Korean ceramics, which are renowned for their long history and rich artistic heritage. Students will learn traditional ceramic techniques alongside the historical, cultural, and artistic contexts of different periods in Korea. The course encourages students to develop an appreciation for the distinctive aesthetics of Korean ceramic art while guiding them in the creation of their own works. Through this process, students will gain an understanding of the significance of ceramics within Korean culture and society.

By the end of the course, students are expected to have developed a solid foundation in traditional Korean ceramics and ceramic-making techniques, thereby broadening their understanding of ceramic art.

5. Evaluation System
