This summer intensive course explores the diverse spectrum of Seoul's dynamic fashion landscape, from traditional Korean aesthetics to contemporary street trends and the high-end fashion of this global metropolis. The course combines lectures with both guided and self-guided field trips, from museum to fashion district, to provide immersive, hands-on experiences. Students will develop comprehensive perspectives on fashion and the city by creating their own "Seoul Fashion Map" based on field research, analyzing the visual, industrial, and sociocultural contexts.
